share a passion for Boulder County. It is a place that has overwhelming and unlimited potential. But despite our beautiful surroundings and apparent affluence, there is much work to be done and much at stake.

This reality comes into stark relief in times of hardship, such as these.

The Community Foundation's ongoing survey of nonprofits reveals that basic needs providers have experienced a 15 to 20 percent increase in requests for assistance. Fortunately, these agencies reported no significant decrease in donations, yet they still have to make their dollars go further. Donations to other nonprofits -- those working in education, youth services, art and the environment -- report lagging donations and are beginning to lay

Like other small businesses in Boulder County, most nonprofits have 50 employees or fewer. Thus, layoffs in the nonprofit sector are a double punch. Not only do they create job losses, but the reduction of just a few employees means service cuts that will impact others who are struggling in this economy.

Further, from a pure business perspective, our local economy depends on a healthy nonprofit sector. In Boulder County, nonprofit organizations represent 9.7 percent of the total workforce. Revenues for county nonprofits are nearly \$1.2 billion annually and expenditures are \$1.1 billion, most of that spent locally.

Times are tough, but the outlook is not all bleak. The challenge for all of us is to innovate and collaborate in ways that support compelling community interest. That is where the Community Foundation and businesses like Roche Colorado

The Community Foundation is the place for inspired giving. It is where corporations learn how they can have the greatest impact on the vision for a better Boulder County. In this way, the Community Foundation helps Roche Colorado and other companies move beyond mere monetary gifts to true meaningful engagement in the health of our community.

A year ago, we dedicated this space to Bill Sterner, the late CEO of Elevations Credit Union. Bill passed away suddenly just as he was preparing to take over

as chair of the Community Foundation Board of Trustees. Bill's philanthropic passion was the Community Trust, the Foundation's unrestricted endowment that funds grants to local nonprofits.

Last September, just as the economy started to nosedive, Roche Colorado joined with other businesses and the Foundation to rally around Bill's cause. We issued a special appeal for the Trust and raised more than \$800,000. That money made it possible for the Foundation to nearly double the cash it awarded to Boulder County nonprofits. It also added handsomely to the Community Foundation's unrestricted endowment and seeded an Impact Fund to help those who are working to improve early childhood education in this community.

Thanks to the more than 800 committed individuals and business, we made good progress toward our four-year, \$4 million fundraising goal. That this all occurred in the midst of an economic recession demonstrates the concern that we share for one another in this community. It also is indicative of all that we can accomplish, with the business and nonprofit communities working together toward addressing local

# Choose

### Reach an organization before donating time or money

If you're contributing your time, which is the most valuable thing you have, you should find something that makes you really happy.

spite of the economic recession, life goes on - as does unemployment, illness, disability, and all the other factors that create impoverishment and need.

Nonprofit associations are there to help, but these organizations are more in need of donor time and money than ever before.

If you've got a few hours or a few dollars to spare, just how do you choose the nonprofit that's right for you? While it may seem obvious that you should follow your heart, how can you make sure that your money or time is being used in exactly the way you think it is? And how do you find out that the organization you've chosen is going to be a good match for your abilities?

The Colorado Nonprofit Association has just completed a series of surveys analyzing the factors driving donor philanthropy in the state, as well as the economic results of that philanthropy. According to the association's Vice President and Chief Operating Officer Sharon Knight, it's a good time for nonprofits, in spite of the recession.

The survey shows that nonprofit donations total \$13.1 billion in annual revenue and bring in \$900 million to the state each year.

"We know from the survey that most people in Colorado choose a nonprofit because they believe in the cause and not only trust in the organization but also trust that it has effective management," Knight said. "But people are also checking more now to see that their money is being used wisely and that the nonprofit they choose is following the rules and guidelines."

Knight said there are accepted guidelines for nonprofits

"While it depends on the individual organization, the general rule of thumb it that a nonprofit should be spending at least 65 percent of its money on fulfilling its mission, and that's a low-end figure," Knight said.

The target number, Knight added, is for a nonprofit to spend less than 25 percent of its proceeds on administration and fundraising. This magic number is recommended by all major nonprofit umbrella organizations, including the United Way.

Knight said, before you give, it's always important to check out the Web site of the organization for an annual report to see how its funds are expended and its programs are run. The Better Business Bureau and the Colorado Secretary of State's office can provide information as to whether or not the nonprofit you choose is in good standing. In addition, the Better Business Bureau publishes a list of "wise giving

tips," which provide some consumer safety ground rules when it comes to giving.

The Colorado Nonprofit Association offers its own guidelines at a separate site, www.generouscolorado.org. Knight recommends checking out information given on local sites such as the one operated by Boulder's Community Fund, www.commfound.org.

But what about those phone calls we get every evening right at the dinner hour and those supplicants who appear on our doorstep, all representing nonprofits we're unfamiliar with?

"A lot of us get phone calls from organizations we've never heard of, and it's important to know whether or not it's a legitimate nonprofit," Knight said. "If you aren't aware of the organization, and they don't offer you any written literature to show that they're a real 501(k) organization, then it's best to do some research first to check them out. If it looks too good to be true, it very well may be."

If you're satisfied with the credentials of your choice, Knight recommends keeping a record of your contributions. This means never paying by cash – you should always pay by check and get a receipt.

While a nonprofit may have a long and time-honored history, it may also be going through a period of bad management. In recent years media scrutiny has exposed a number of nonprofits under inefficient or even corrupt management. Thanks to this type of

exposure, which has led to heightened awareness on the part of the consumer, it's considerably more difficult now for a crooked CEO to cash in those donation checks, jump into his Ferrari and head off into a life of incognito expatriation on a tropical island.

"Most nonprofits are doing an exceptional job, so mismanagement isn't a frequent problem," Knight said. "But every donor has their own comfort level about how money is expended, and you have the right to ask for a report on how the money is spent."

While nonprofits need money, they also need volunteers. And with disposable incomes shrinking, it's more feasible for many people these days to give time instead of money.

"This is a time of extraordinary volunteerism – more than ever before," Knight said. "In our study, we found that 21 percent of the people we surveyed volunteer six to 10 hours a month, while almost 12 percent give 30 and more hours a month. People may not be able to give money in this economy, but a lot of them are giving of themselves."

Once you decide to apply as a volunteer, Knight said you treat that initial encounter much like a job interview.

"You have the right to get a job description to find out what's expected of you and to see if you really have the tools to do it," she said. "If you're contributing your time, which is the most valuable thing you have, you should find something that makes you really happy."

### Retired computer programmer shares career skills with fellow seniors

SeniorNet is an international nonprofit based in Herndon, Va., that

teaches basic computer skills to adults 50 and older. The nonprofit has learning centers across the U.S. and Snyder is the coordinator for the program in Longmont, SeniorNet's only location in Colorado.

The program in Longmont is a local partnership between the city of Longmont, Longmont Senior Services and Front Range Community College. It has 60 volunteers and 300 members and is a program for seniors, taught by seniors, in small classes, at a speed and in a language they can understand. The curriculum and manuals are designed to provide older adults education for and access to computer technologies to

### Urge to help spurs business owner to devote efforts to worthy causes

esides working 80-hour weeks to keep his business going, David Rubin still finds time to volunteer

with, among other organizations, the March of Dimes Foundation.

Rubin, president and general manager of Boulder-based A Spice of Life Catering Services and Event Centers, has been volunteering

for March of Dimes since 1995 when someone asked him for help.

The organization helps improve babies' health through raising money, community outreach, education and advocacy. Though Rubin didn't have kids at that time, he had friends who did and some of those children had health issues.

Rubin said regarding when he started volunteering.

So he helped organize the Signature Chef event that's typically scheduled for November. The event, which in its first year collected about \$15,000 from the 100 attendees, now collects about \$122,000 and sees about 500 people walk through the doors.

Rubin, using his background in food and events, served as the chairman and helped organize the 22 chefs, silent and live auctions, speakers and other logistics for the Signature Chef event. Every week for six months he spent five to 10 hours working on making it a success.

fter retiring from a career working at the former Spectralink and GE Access in Boulder, Missy Carrier got hooked on volunteering.

### Career firefighter works in Denver, volunteers in hometown Louisville

"Just because it's my career doesn't mean it's not a good way to volunteer," he said.

osh Schmidt works as a career firefighter at South Metro fire department in Denver where he puts in 10 24-hour shifts a month.

During his spare time, he goes to the Louisville fire department and volunteers another three shifts a week

For the past 10 years, Schmidt has volunteered at the fire department once a week, taking an eight- to 12-hour shift,

he volunteers as an officer and is joined by three or four other firefighters who stay on call.

Twice a week Schmidt volunteers to teach classes for the new firefighter academy. These usually take place on Fridays and Saturdays.

All this started in 1998 when Schmidt was a sophomore at the University of Colorado studying molecular, cellular and development biology to become a doctor. That year he decided to start volunteering, and in his senior year he was offered work as a career firefighter. Still finding it important to finish his career, Schmidt worked, volunteered and went to college, taking an extra three years to graduate.

"When setting up a donor-advised fund we explore what the donor would like the focus of the fund to be," said Chris Barge, director of philanthropic services for the foundation. "Some people have a specific idea, and others are not sure. We help each donor with the general process."

He said nonprofits in Boulder County focused on basic needs have been minimally affected by the recession, but overall donations in 2009 are down.

"When people have lost more money than earned, they decide they do not have extra to give," Barge said. "Our role is to keep in touch with the donors and nonprofit community to educate them about where gifts can make the highest impact."

The foundation has three kinds of donor-advised funds: The Endowed Fund, The Gift Fund and The Impact Fund. Each of the fund types has fund advisers composed of family, friends or advisers named by the donor. Additions to the funds can be made at any time. Grant funds can be established by individuals, families and corporations.

The Endowed Fund capital is invested using a long-term growth strategy for future benefits and requires a \$25,000 minimum to establish. Donors may request that up to 5 percent of the fund be used annually for grantmaking. The fund can be named by the donor or remain an anonymous fund.

The Gift Fund also requires \$25,000 to establish, but the donor may distribute as much or as little from the fund including spending it down to a zero balance. The minimum grant distribution for either fund is \$500 throughout the year.

The Impact Fund is invested in The Community Foundation's investment pool, allowing the principal to grow over time and requires a minimum of \$250,000. Donors may request up to 20 percent of the fund be used for grantmaking. The minimum grant distribution is \$1,000 throughout the year.

Rick Sterling, a Boulder resident, donor and member of the board of trustees for The Community Foundation, said the foundation is a way to learn about nonprofits while promoting philanthropy.

"I was giving money directly to organizations that I care about," Sterling said. "Frankly it is easier to do it though The Community Foundation in one lump sum to my fund and send an e-mail as to which groups I would like the funds to go to. If you help to make life easier for your neighbors, it makes for a better community."

He said the foundation helps to navigate what nonprofit organizations are dealing with concerning the issues donors care about.

Maria Aweida, a Boulder County resident who gives to The Community Foundation, said she and her family like to contribute and give back to the community they love.

"It is a good feeling being able to share" she said.

All donations are managed by the foundation's board of

trustees, which is composed of 21 people. If a donor has a specific grant request, the majority of time it is honored. The Community Foundation researches all nonprofit organizations receiving funding.

The foundation was established in 1991. It has 10 employees and more than 100 volunteers. In 2008, more than 800 people contributed to the community trust fund, and 200 contributions were given to donor advised funds. More than 25 businesses have established donor-advised funds as well as sponsored foundation events.

In 2007, total fundraising was \$7.3 million and grant giving was \$5.2 million. In 2008, total fundraising was \$4.7 million and grant giving was \$4.8 million. Barge said because The Community Foundation is run as an endowed model, it is able to maintain its giving levels during fluctuations in the economy. The community trust fund, one of 225 donor-advised funds, received \$175,000 by January 2008 and \$320,000 by January 2009. This fund allow people to make any contribution amount.

The Community Foundation's expenses, including salaries, were just shy of \$1 million in 2008. The funding comes from fees of less than 2 percent associated with the endowments and interest earned from fund investing.


Barge said the 225 established donor-advised funds maintained their giving levels, but very few new funds have been established. He expects grantmaking in 2009 to remain the same as 2008.

"It makes me feel inspired to be a part of The Community Foundation," Barge said. "This is a saving account for Boulder County's future."

Josie Heath, president of The Community Foundation, said there are three options because some people want to make an impact immediately.

"We began with the Endowed Fund, and donors told us they wanted the opportunity to pay out more than the typical 5 percent," Heath said. "We adapted funds to accommodate that. Some donors want to see their funds used right away, while others like the long-term investment to fund the thing they care about."

### **Working with Our Workforce**

In addition to concern and passion for the community at large, we also share a passion for the vitality of Boulder County's vibrant business community and our places of work. And we all know the value of skilled and high-quality workers.

The Community Foundation has been concerned for some time about a widening gap in the achievement of our high school students, and the difficultly that can contribute to finding good employees. On one side of that gap, we are looking very smart: the graduation rates in both Boulder Valley and St. Vrain schools exceed Colorado's overall rate, and Boulder was recently recognized as the "Smartest City in America" based on the high number of college graduates who live and work here. But many of our students, primarily those whose families live in poverty, are being left behind by the school system.

Among BVSD 3rd graders who do not qualify for a free lunch, for example, 92 percent scored "proficient" or "advanced" on their reading CSAPs. That rate was just over half for the students enrolled in the Free and Reduced Lunch Program. The gap has increased from just two years earlier. Achievement differences continue to grow as students age, leading to a drop out rate that is many times higher.

This gap creates significant and lifelong impacts on earning power for these students. The median annual income of a Boulder County resident who doesn't finish high school is less than half of that of a college graduate (\$19,000 vs. \$43,000).

### Catch It Early

The Foundation has done extensive research on the topic of the achievement gap in our high schools. And despite it being a complex issue, it turns out everyone agrees on one thing: by high school, it may already be too late. The work that can make the biggest impact on a student's performance happens early in life. To move the needle in the high school

achievement gap, interventions have to begin in much younger children.

That's why The Community Foundation is launching a four-year initiative to address the achievement gap, starting in early childhood. Beginning in 2009, we will fund and convene our community's resources to share what we know about the importance of early childhood education. We will bring together the right players to make a difference.

### The Community Trust and Our Million Dollar Mission

The Early Childhood Initiative is one piece of The Community Foundation's current focus to build The Community Trust. This is the fund from which we fund initiatives, such as addressing the achievement gap, and make grants to the Boulder County nonprofits that apply to us for support. Grants are awarded through a competitive evaluation process conducted by staff, foundation trustees and volunteer grants committees.

Over the years, we have been able to do some early "seed funding" from The Community Trust for start-up groups, many of which have grown into community mainstays. It is also the fund that supports basic need requests such as those from groups that provide food, shelter, medical and various mental health needs. And it is one of the few resources for groups working in the arts, education, youth opportunities, the environment, and civic engagement

to apply for operating support.

Our goal is to raise \$4 million for The Community Trust in four years. This will enable us to fund The Early Childhood Initiative and also permanently double our responsive grant-making. We looked for support in this passionate and wise community, and the community responded.

So far, despite a weak economy and despite several of our foundation colleagues leveling off or decreasing grant funding, we were able to almost double our support for nonprofits, when we awarded grants earlier this year. They needed the support; many report that their client load is up 10-15 percent and donations are down. We think that is one of the primary roles of an inspired foundation – to be there when times are tough.

### **Businesses Stepping Up**

The Community Foundation has helped many businesses make a meaningful impact on our fellow residents' quality of life today and for the future. Here are some of the ways:

- Businesses have made contributions for one or more years to help the Foundation reach its Community Trust goals, thereby investing in a permanent community resource. We are less than one year into a four-year, four-million dollar goal.
- Companies work with the Foundation to run their corporate giving programs. They set up named foundations under the umbrella of The Community Foundation, and then take advantage


of our services to help refine giving areas, screen requests, write checks and evaluate grant impact.

- They sponsor Community Foundation events, getting their names out to our supporters and friends in the private sector, as well as the business and nonprofit communities.

than century, United Way has stood behind its mission of gathering resources and channeling funding to help communities throughout the nation. Since 1922, Foothills United Way has been serving the local community, living

"It's not a slogan or a tagline - it's a culture," said Pat Monacelli, Foothills United Way director of marketing and communications. 



### Contributions as a percent of income all states




While Coloradans are extremely generous, the state ranks low in charitable giving when compared to the rest of the country. Even though Colorado ranks fifth in average income, it ranks 38th in charitable contributions as a percent of that income.

### Average contribution Colorado vs. U.S.



Coloradans gave 3.1 percent of their income to charity, while the average American contributed 3.4 percent. In terms of the average amount of charitable giving, Coloradans gave \$4,046 to charities during 2006. This was down from \$4,074 in 2005. his gap between giving in Colorado and giving in the U.S. as a whole is not new. For every year since 2000, the amount of income donated by Coloradans has been significantly short of that given by the average American.

### Counties in Denver metro region contributions as a percent of income



Donors in the seven-county metropolitan Denver region gave nearly \$1.8 billion to charity in 2006. This total represents more than half of the \$3.1 billion in itemized contributions given by all Coloradans. Although donors in this region gave \$1.8 billion during the study period, their total giving was \$23 million less than the year before. Contributions as a percent of income in Boulder County averaged 2.7 percent, and Broomfield County's contributions as a percent of income were 2.5 percent.

### Cities and towns in Denver metro region, percent of income contributed


The city of Boulder saw a significant decrease in giving when compared to the prior year. In 2006, donors there gave 2.9 percent of their income to charity, down from 3.8 percent the year earlier. In 2005, Boulderites gave at levels greater than their national, state, and regional counterparts. In 2006, their giving dropped below all three of those categories of donors. Still, residents of Boulder gave an average of \$5,534 to charity, much more than the \$4,046 state average. Longmont residents on average contributed 2.7 percent, and Broomfield residents contributed 2.5 percent.




For the second year in a row, the Southwest, Central, and Northwest regions of Colorado led the rest of the state in charitable giving. Even more impressive is the fact that donors in these regions yet again exceeded not only the Colorado average, but the national average in terms of charitable giving as a percent of adjusted gross income. While there were fluctuations in the percent of giving within regions and across the state, the six regions ironically performed in the identical order in terms of most to least giving as a percent of income as indicated in 2005.

### Charitable giving by individuals in Colorado

For the second year in a row, total charitable giving by individuals in Colorado was \$3.8 billion, according to 2006 tax return data recently released by the Internal Revenue Service. More than \$3.1 billion of that total was reported on the tax returns of donors who itemize their tax deductions, while \$634 million is estimated by the Colorado Nonprofit Association to have been contributed by donors who do not itemize deductions on their annual tax returns.

enhance their lives.

Front Range Community College supplies a classroom, computers and IT support for the service. Volunteer instructors like Snyder conduct courses and workshops.

"They want to know how to use the Internet and e-mail to communicate with children and grandchildren." Snyder said. "They want to know how to send and receive attachments. The most popular is the digital camera and photo editing class."

Snyder has been involved with the program since 2001. Each student has a coach who sits with them at the computer. The service offers Snyder a way to put her free time and her computer skills to good use. As an instructor, she has been able to transfer her corporate experience to the nonprofit sector.

"When I worked at IBM, I never took the time to get involved in my community. Now, I have the time to be more active in the community and give something of myself. Using my computer skills with SeniorNet is a perfect match. I continually feel that I am receiving more than I am giving."

One senior Snyder has been particularly inspired by is Mary Lou Hogan, who at age 80 began writing her life story on a typewriter.

"She knew nothing about computers and learned word processing and photo editing. After the training, she scanned in more than 500 photos. Her husband was a navigator in World War II. His plane crashed and he became a prisoner of war. She has since published the story. We've met many people who have WW2 stories or connections they want to write down."

And he doesn't plan on walking away from volunteerism.

Besides also volunteering with the Boulder Chamber, the American Cancer Society Inc., a local lacrosse foundation and more, Rubin has spent more than 14 years giving back to the community as much as he can.

Last year Rubin said he and his company donated to 40 nonprofit organizations via time, money, food, staff and services. He's learned to say "no" to the countless requests he simply can't fulfill, yet he wishes he could give more.

"Making a difference is what it's all about," he said.

In a typical month, the Syracuse, N.Y. native, who has a wife and three kids, spends five hours volunteering and encourages his employees to do the same. Often that encouragement means giving an employee paid time off to volunteer with a meaningful organization.

"If you have money to give then give money. If you have time to give, give time, or if you have wisdom, give wisdom," Rubin said, citing Linda Loewenstein, the executive director of Boulder's Jewish Community Center.

### **Community Food Share**



**Food Share** is dedicated to improving lives by turning small acts of generosity and kindness into a big difference in the lives of hungry families with children and individuals in our community. Working through 57 Member Agencies and their own Direct Service programs, Community Food Share efficiently delivered more than five million meals in 2008, and serves as a safety net for those who are hungry in Boulder and Broomfield counties.

From its grassroots beginnings nearly
30 years ago — when a handful of volunteers went door to door asking for donations of food to feed the hungry

 Community Food Share has grown to become a major source of sustenance for our community, putting food on the tables of thousands of people in Boulder and Broomfield counties.

Community Food Share was founded in 1981. Jim Baldwin took over as the nonprofit's CEO in 2000, and now oversees 17 full- and part-time staffers at the organization's 22,400 sq. ft. warehouse in Niwot. According to Baldwin, at the heart of the national food bank philosophy is the idea that food should never be allowed to go to waste. But Community Food Share also addresses the second half of that equation — how to make sure the food gets to the people who need it.

"People don't realize that in a fairly affluent area like ours, there is a real and growing need for food assistance," he said. "We help everyone from the 'working poor' to the homeless person on the street."

In Boulder and Broomfield counties there are 50,000 people living at the poverty level for our area, which is \$27,500/year for a family of four – that's enough to fill Folsom Field! Lately, this need has been exacerbated by the struggling economy and rising unemployment – along with the high costs of gas and food.

In 2008, more than 2,500 volunteers donated a staggering 32,000 hours processing food contributions from local donors such as WhiteWave Foods, King Soopers, Safeway, Whole Foods, Super Target, and the organization's newest supporter, Wal-Mart and Sam's Club. Community Food Share also locates donated food regionally and nationally, paying for the transportation. Finally, 15% of the food is purchased on the wholesale market to supplement inventory.

Community Food Share works through 57 Member Agencies — including organizations such as the Boulder Shelter for the Homeless, the Emergency Family Assistance Association, the O.U.R. Center in Longmont, and the Sister Carmen Center in Lafayette. Member Agencies pay a flat \$250 membership fee annually. "Of the 5.3 million meals distributed last year, 63 percent went to Member Agencies" Baldwin said. All food

is distributed free of charge and is consistent with the Food Guide Pyramid. The majority of the food distributed to Member Agencies is prepared and delivered by Community Food Share staff and volunteers, free of charge.

Community Food Share operates several Direct Service Programs which target atrisk populations such as Elder Share, which focuses on low-income seniors, and Feeding Families, which distributes food to families with children in the School Free Lunch program in both school districts.

Feeding Families is the largest Direct Service program. Eligible families can come weekly — Thursday, Friday or Saturday — to select a grocery cart of food (approximately 80 to 100 pounds). Last year, Community Food Share distributed 1.3 million meals, of the total 5.3 million, through this program.


Because of its size and membership in Feeding America (formerly America's Second Harvest), Community Food Share can leverage donated dollars. For every dollar donated, Community Food Share can distribute four meals. Another indicator of efficiency and effectiveness is the fact that, in 2008, Community Food Share received Charity Navigator's highest rating for the fifth consecutive year. Charity Navigator is the nation's leading evaluator of charities, and only 3 percent of the charities rated received this level.

However, the need for food assistance is increasing dramatically. Distribution in 2008 was 800,000 meals more than in 2007. And, according to Baldwin, as long as the economy continues in its present state, Community Food Share's resources will continue to be challenged. "Every time you turn around, you hear about a company that's laying off people," he said. "The people affected may not come to us immediately — but they'll be turning to one of our Member Agencies or to our Direct Service programs in three to six months. Right now, we're extremely challenged because of the uncertainty of the economy and sufficient sources of food to meet the growing demand. The main thing is to keep our doors open, and our services flowing. And with the community's help, we will."

### :: glossary of **nonprofit terms**::

### ADVISED OR DESIGNATED FUND

A fund held by a community foundation where the donor may recommend eligible charitable recipients for grants.

### **AFFILIATE FUND**

Local fund affiliated with a foundation.

#### AGENCY ENDOWMENT

A fund established within a community foundation or other public foundation by a nonprofit organization.

### ANNIVERSARY OR BIRTHDAY CAMPAIGN

A fundraising campaign centered around an anniversary date of an institution on the premise that the occasion will stimulate giving.

### **AREA OF INTEREST FUND**

A fund that allows donors to direct funding to a particular cause or specific geographical area.

### BEQUEST OR CHARITABLE DEFERRED GIFT

A donation made to a charity named as beneficiary under a will or trust.

### CAUSE OR CAUSE-RELATED MARKETING

A partnership between a for-profit company and a nonprofit organization that increases the company's sales while raising money and visibility for the cause.

### CHALLENGE, CONDITION OR MATCHING GIFT OR GRANT

A grant that is paid only if the nonprofit is able to raise additional funds from other sources.

### **CHARITABLE CLASS**

The group of people that may legally receive assistance from a charitable organization. A charitable class must be large or indefinite enough that providing aid to members of the class benefits the community as a whole.

### CHARITABLE DEDUCTION

The portion of a gift to a qualified charity

that is deductible from an individual's or corporation's federal income tax, individual's gift tax or individual's estate tax.

### **CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITY**

A contract under which a charity, in return for a transfer of cash, marketable securities or other assets, agrees to pay a fixed amount of money to an individual during his or her lifetime.

### **CHARITABLE LEAD TRUST**

A trust that provides an income stream to a charity for a specified period of time. At the end of that period, trust assets are distributed to noncharitable beneficiaries such as children or grandchildren.

#### **CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST**

An arrangement in which property or money is donated to a charity, but the donor continues to use the property and/ or receive income from it while living.

### COMMUNITY OR PUBLIC FOUNDATION

A nonprofit, publicly supported, nonsectarian philanthropic institution with a goal of building permanent funds established by separate donors for the broad-based charitable benefit of the residents of a defined geographic area.

### **COMMUNITY FUND**

An organized community program that makes appeals to the public for funds to be used for the ongoing operational support of local agencies.

### **CORPORATE CITIZENSHIP**

Business giving, including business relationships and partnerships with nonprofit organizations.

### **CORPORATE FOUNDATION**

A private foundation that receives its funding from the for-profit company whose name it bears but is legally an independent entity.

### **CORPORATE GIVING PROGRAM**

A grant-making program established and administered within a for-profit corporation.

### CORPORATE VOLUNTEER COUNCIL

A network that businesses join to address community needs through workplace volunteering.

### CORPORATE, EMPLOYEE OR WORKPLACE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

A company-managed program that coordinates company staff with nonprofits looking for volunteers.

#### **DEMONSTRATION GRANT**

A grant made to establish an innovative project or program that will serve as a model. If successful it may be replicated by others.

### **DESIGNATED ENDOWMENT**

Established by an individual, family or business to benefit one or more charities.

### EMPLOYEE MATCHING GIFT OR GRANT

A program whereby an employee's contribution to a charitable organization is matched by a similar contribution from the employer.

### **ENDOWED FUND**

A fund created by gifts that establish its principal, which then makes grants from the income generated by that principal. An endowed fund exists in perpetuity and continues to carry out the donor's wishes after death.

### **ENDOWMENT**

A permanently restricted fund, the principal of which is protected and the income from which may be spent.

### **EVALUATION OR PILOT GRANT**

A grant that supports the external evaluation of a project. With a successful project, the evaluation grant works as a leveraging tool, enabling the recipient to seek further funding.

### **FEDERATED FUNDER**

A joint fundraising effort administered by a nonprofit "umbrella" organization

that in turn distributes funds to nonprofit agencies. Examples include United Way, United Jewish Appeal and United Negro College Fund.

### **FLOW-THROUGH FUNDS**

Contributions to a foundation that are used primarily for direct grant making rather than for endowing the foundation.

#### **FOUNDATION**

Apublic or private nonprofit corporation or trust that makes grants to organizations, institutions or individuals for scientific, educational, cultural, religious or other charitable purposes.

#### **IN-KIND DONATION OR GIFT**

A gift of goods or services rather than cash or property.

### **INITIATIVE-BASED GRANT MAKING**

A grants program based on applicants responding to a request for proposals.

### **IRREVOCABLE TRUST**

A gift in trust that cannot be rescinded.

### LIMITED-PURPOSE FOUNDATION

A foundation that restricts its giving to one or very few areas of interest, such as higher education or medical care.

### **MEMORIAL OR NAMED FUND**

A fund established by, or named for, an individual, family, corporation or other group to carry out the charitable interests of the donor or honoree.

### **NONENDOWED FUND**

In contrast to endowed funds that can only make grants from interest income, a nonendowed fund's principal can be used for grants.

### **NONPROFIT**

An organization established for activities other than profit making. Some nonprofits are exempt from federal income taxation, but they may be taxed on income from unrelated businesses they conduct.

Common nonprofits include:

### 501 C (3)

A public charity or private foundation.

Gifts to a 501 c (3) are tax-deductible.

#### 501 C (4)

A social welfare or employees' association whose net earnings are used solely for charitable, educational or recreational purposes.

#### 501 C (6

A trade association or business leagues not organized for profit or private benefit.

### 501 C (7)

A social club organized for pleasure and recreation.

#### 501 C(8)

A fraternal beneficiary society, order or association operating under the lodge system that provides benefits to members and their dependents.

### 501 C (12)

A benevolent life insurance association, cooperative or ditch or irrigation company.

### **OPERATING FOUNDATION**

A private foundation that uses the bulk of its income to provide charitable services or to run charitable programs of its own.

#### **PARTNERSHIP FUNDING**

A grant program where "partners" often government and philanthropic sources have input into the project.

### PASS-THROUGH FOUNDATION

A foundation that receives funds and makes distributions with little or no principal remaining with the foundation.

### **PERPETUAL TRUST**

A trust established with the intent to keep the principal invested in perpetuity and distribute the income from investments to one or more charities.

#### PROGRAM OR PROJECT GRANTS

Funds to support specific projects or programs as opposed to general support grants.

### **PROGRAM RELATED INVESTMENT**

A loan (not a grant) made by a foundation

to another organization for a project related to the foundation's interests.

### RESTRICTED ENDOWMENT INCOME

Income from a permanent fund used for a specified purpose.

### RESTRICTED FUND, GIFT OR GRANT

Money given with donors' specifications on how a nonprofit may use it.

### **REVOCABLE TRUST**

A trust that can be recalled by its creator. Revocable trusts become irrevocable when their creators die and can become irrevocable sooner if the creators give up the power to revoke.

#### **SOCIAL ENTERPRISE**

A nonprofit venture that combines the passion of a social mission with the innovation and determination commonly associated with for-profit businesses.

**SOCIAL ENTREPRENEUR** – An individual who engages in social enterprise, drawing upon the best thinking in both the business and nonprofit worlds.

### **SOCIAL VENTURE FUNDS**

Charitable funds in which donors invest their expertise as well as their money, providing support and requiring accountability of nonprofit organizations just as venture capitalists do in business enterprises.

### **SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE INVESTING**

The practice of aligning a foundation's investment policies with its mission. This may include refraining from investing in corporations with products or policies inconsistent with the foundation's values.

### **UNRESTRICTED FUND**

A fund that is not specifically designated for a particular use by the donor, or for which restrictions have expired or been removed.




